



A+ College Ready Middle School Training and Incentive Program Pilot (MSTIP)

Application Due November 15, 2019

A+ College Ready, in partnership with the Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE), is issuing a competitive Request for Proposal (RFP) for participation in the ALSDE/A+ College Readiness Program. A+ College Ready, on behalf of the Alabama State Department of Education, partners with Alabama's public schools to increase the number of students:

- Enrolled in challenging courses in Grades 6-10 and Pre-Calculus as well as Advanced Placement (AP®) courses in Grades 11 and 12.
- Taught by well-trained teachers with strategic resources.
- Meeting or exceeding annual academic growth metrics.
- Prepared to access college, career, or other post-secondary opportunities with no need for remediation following high school graduation.
- Attending and graduating from college.

A program of the A+ Education Partnership, A+ College Ready is a non-partisan, nonprofit organization that works with Alabama schools, the ALSDE, and public and private funders to maximize the number of students who are prepared for college or any other pursuit upon graduation from high school. There are currently 189 Alabama High schools represented in 12 cohorts. The original goal of the program was to strengthen the teaching of AP mathematics, science, and English courses, to build enrollment in these courses, and to increase the number of students taking and earning qualifying scores on AP exams in Alabama public schools. However, the work has evolved in the last twelve years and concentrates equally on the preparation of a robust and diverse pipeline of students in Grades 6-10 who will be prepared for the rigorous coursework in high school, including Advanced Placement. Additionally, the menu of AP courses supported by the A+ College Ready program now includes AP U. S. History, AP Government and Politics (added in 2015-2016), AP Computer Science Principles (added in 2016-2017) and AP Macroeconomics (to be added in 2020-2021).

The A+ College Ready training and incentive program is designed to support the implementation of Alabama's College- and Career-Ready Standards (CCRS) in all four core disciplines as well as the Digital Literacy and Computer Science (DLCS) Standards in Grades 6-12. To further that goal, A+ College Ready has expanded its original focus on preparing students for the challenges of college and career to include training and support for the implementation of teacher-developed A+ College Ready curricula in Grades 6-10 (Grade 11 in mathematics) in English, mathematics, science, social studies, and computer science.





The Middle School Training and Incentive Program (MSTIP) is modeled after the Advanced Placement Training and Incentive Program (APTIP) that has dramatically increased student access and success in Advanced Placement math, science, English, social studies and Computer Science in Alabama. Components of the program include teacher training, administrator training and support, teacher empowerment through equipment/materials/supplies, and teacher, leader, and student incentives based upon student achievement and growth as measured by the Alabama Comprehensive Assessment Program (ACAP). The goal of the program is to raise the expectations and rigor in classrooms, and to build a pipeline of students prepared for any pathway they choose in high school, including participation in Advanced Placement coursework.

ALSDE/A+ College Ready MSTIP Program features include:

- Voluntary participation on the part of districts, schools, teachers, and students.
- Two years of rigorous content, and pedagogical training (E3) for teachers in the supported courses based on the Alabama courses of study.
- Equipment/supplies/materials for teachers who commit to FULL participation in and implementation of the A+ College Ready MSTIP program.
- Teacher support provided by A+ College Ready content staff.
- Consumable materials allowance and potential for earning stipends for middle school teachers who attend required training(s) and sign an annual Letter of Agreement(LOA).
- Ambitious goal setting for student access, growth, and achievement for supported courses.
- Annual financial incentives/stipends for teachers and their students based on ACAP score growth and achievement.





<u>District/School Responsibilities:</u>

Participation in the ALSDE/MSTIP A+ College Ready program will require investment and other considerations on the part of participating schools/districts. Some of those investments and considerations include:

- Holding high expectations for ALL administrators, teachers, and students.
- Promoting appropriate course pathways that maximize opportunities for ALL STUDENTS to participate in rigorous, grade-level coursework.
- Providing necessary facilities, textbooks (when needed), and resources for full access and participation in all program components.
- Providing leadership and the local expectation that 100% of teachers in math, science, English, social studies and computer science will attend three years of A+ College Ready E3 summer training and implement the lessons/strategies/assessments associated with the training. NOTE: While situations arise preventing some teachers from attending training, a school's participation in the program will be discontinued if fewer than 80% of supported teachers do not attend training and sign the Letter of Agreement.
- Sharing enrollment data, standardized test data, and other pertinent information with A+ College Ready staff for program analysis and progress monitoring.
- Providing support and travel costs and approving professional leave for teachers to attend A+ College Ready professional development (E3 training during summer, 4 days; one-day fall workshops in Oct/Nov).
- Coordinating the receipt, distribution, and document organization associated with materials supplied to the school/teachers.
- Working with local community stakeholders, including parents, to support high expectations through rigorous coursework in order to improve student growth
- Understanding that teachers and students will be eligible for stipends and incentives based on growth and/or achievement.
- Attending a day-long Leadership Launch to describe the program and leadership responsibilities in spring, 2020.
- Appointing an A+ Coordinator who will serve as the liaison between A+ College Ready and the school and who will manage the A+ College Ready Data Reporting System on behalf of the school.





Teacher Responsibilities:

- Participating schools MUST HAVE a minimum of 80% of all teachers in supported courses
 attend summer training and commit to signing a Letter of Agreement (LOA) each of the years of
 the program. While it is expected that 100% of the teachers will attend, if fewer than 80% of a
 school's teachers attend all four days of training and/or sign a Letter of Agreement (LOA), the
 partnership will be discontinued for that and subsequent years.
- Teachers commit to holding ALL STUDENTS to high academic expectations and providing the scaffolding and support to foster students' attainment of the high expectations.
- Teachers will attend and actively participate in four-day E3 summer training during each year of the program.
- Teachers will attend and actively participate in the annual one-day fall workshop for their course during each year of the program.
- Each year, teachers will work to increase the number of students meeting significant benchmarks and showing significant growth on the ACAP assessment in their discipline, with special attention to achievement and improvement of students in underserved populations.
- Teachers will use the A+ College Ready curricular materials and will commit to teaching all of their course standards during the school year.
- Teachers will submit all required program documentation/records, including the A+ College Ready Data Reporting System (DRS) requirements in a timely manner.

<u>The deadline for RFP submission is Wednesday, November 6, 2019.</u> School site visits will be scheduled between that date and January 2020. Schools will be notified of the outcome of the selection process by February 2020. Five schools will be selected for the pilot program.
